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#### ADA SUE HINSHAW AWARD

The Ada Sue Hinshaw Award is considered the pre-eminent award given by FNINR named in honor of the first permanent Director of the National Institute of Nursing Research. Recipients have a substantive and sustained program of science that would afford her/him recognition as a prominent senior scientist.

#### THE PRESIDENT'S AWARD

The President's Award is given based on a specific theme established by the President of FNINR, varies annually, and is awarded to a researcher with sustained contributions in the field. This year, the theme is "race, ethnicity, culture, and disparities in healthcare" aimed at research that explores differences in quality of care for racial, ethnic and/or cultural minorities. The research should identify contributing factors, effective interventions, or evaluation of interventions.

#### WELCH/WOERNER PATH-PAVER AWARD

The Welch/Woerner Path-Paver Award is given to a mid-to-late career nurse scientist who has achieved one or more breakthroughs in theory development, research methods, instruments, or subject matter that has paved the way for other scientists and who has influenced and mentored the next generation of nurse researchers.

#### FAYE GLENN ABDELLAH AWARD

The Faye Glenn Abdellah Leadership Award is named for this renowned nurse researcher. Faye Abdellah's vision has resulted in inestimable value created by nurse scientists over the years. This award will go to an organization or individual with a sustained or lasting impact on nursing science either through advocacy, institutional leadership, or individual program of research that has led to the public awareness of the value of nursing science in improving health at the individual and/or population levels.

#### **PROTÉGÉ AWARD**

The Protégé/Protegee Award is given to an evolving nurse scientist who shows great promise in advancing science and who is within the first 6 years of completing either the PhD or Post-Doctoral study.







### Ellen J. Hahn

PhD, RN, FAAN

Ellen J. Hahn is a Professor in the Colleges of Nursing and Public Health at the University of Kentucky (UK) in Lexington. She holds the Marcia A. Dake Endowed Professorship in the College of Nursing. Dr. Hahn is Director for UK-CARES (Center for Appalachian Research in Environmental Sciences; P30 ES026529). Dr. Hahn is also the Director for the Occupational and Environmental Health Nursing (OEHN) Core of the NIOSH-funded Central Appalachian Regional Education and Research Center (CARERC). Dr. Hahn also directs the Kentucky Center for Smoke-free Policy and the BREATHE (Bridging Research Efforts and Advocacy Toward Healthy Environments) research team in the College of Nursing. Dr. Hahn conducts community-engaged environmental health outreach and research to reduce risk from tobacco use, tobacco smoke exposure, and radon exposure especially in disparate rural, lower-income communities. She leads two types of community-engaged research and outreach initiatives in implementation and dissemination science: 1) population-based environmental risk reduction intervention and observational studies; and 2) development and testing of evidence-based policy advocacy interventions guided by stage of community readiness to promote policy change. Dr. Hahn has worked with community partners to conduct several citizen science projects to reduce environmental risks from tobacco smoke and radon exposure.



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# Barbara Resnick

Barbara Resnick, PhD, RN, CRNP, FAAN, FAANP, obtained her BSN from the University of Connecticut, her MSN from the University of Pennsylvania, and her PhD from the University of Maryland. She is a professor in the Department of Organizational Systems and Adult Health at the University of Maryland School of Nursing, co-directs the Biology and Behavior Across the Lifespan Organized Research Center, holds the Sonya Ziporkin Gershowitz Chair in Gerontology, and does clinical work at Roland Park Place. Her research program is focused on optimizing function and physical activity among older adults, exploring resilience and genetics on function and physical activity, and testing dissemination and implementation of interventions in real-world settings. This work has been supported by the National Institutes of Health, Agency for Health Care Quality, and foundations such as the Helen and Leonard Stulman Foundation and the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation. Dr. Resnick has authored over 300 published articles, numerous chapters in nursing and medical textbooks, and books on restorative care and resilience. She is the editor of Geriatric Nursing and an associate editor and on editorial board for numerous other journals. She has held leadership positions in multiple aging and interdisciplinary organizations, including the American Geriatrics Society and the Gerontological Society of America and the American Medical Directors Association. She has been recognized for numerous national awards, the most recent of which include the 2017 David H. Solomon Memorial Public Service Award, the 2018 Johns Hopkins Leader in Aging Award, the 2018 Loretta Ford Award, the 2019 Lawton Powell Award, and the 2021 William Dodd Founder's Award for Distinguished Service. In addition to teaching and conducting research, Dr. Resnick continues to practice as a geriatric nurse practitioner in a continuing care retirement community.





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### **Frances Marcus Lewis** RN, MN, MA, PHD, FAAN

Frances Marcus Lewis, RN, MN, MA, PhD, FAAN graduated summa cum laude from Loretto Heights College, Regis University; obtained her MN degree in nursing at the University of Washington and her PhD from Stanford in the social sciences. She completed her post-doctoral studies at Johns Hopkins University, School of Public Health, and her Fellowship at Harvard Medical School. She has devoted her career to studying the impact of serious medical illness on household family members, including the index patient, spouse/caregiver, and school age children. Early work included longitudinal, descriptive studies using mixed methods with household families which enabled her and her team describe the explanatory mechanisms by which households were impacted by serious medical illness; cancer is her clinical prototype. Current work includes multiple Phase II and III randomized control trials, parents with end-stage cancer, and health disparities research.

She was selected as a Distinguished Professor of Oncology Nursing by the Oncology Nursing Society, the first nurse awarded the Susan G. Komen Cancer Survivorship Award, recipient of the Mayhew Derryberry Award from the American Public Health Association, chosen by the Society of Behavioral Medicine to deliver the Master Lecture, selected by the Japanese Society for the Promotion of Science as a visiting scholar, and elected as a visiting scholar and keynote speaker by universities and provider systems in Japan, Russia, Ukraine, Taiwan, Brazil, and by the National Cancer Institute and National Institute of Nursing Research, among other honors. She is currently the Endowed Professor of Nursing Leadership at the University of Washington Medical Center.



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#### AWARD



Jillian Pintye RN, MPH, PhD Dr. Jillian Pintye is an Assistant Professor at the University of Washington School of Nursing in Seattle. Her research focuses on HIV and STI prevention and treatment, particularly among pregnant populations and adolescent girls and young women. Dr. Pintye is engaged in multiple studies related to pre-exposure prophylaxis for HIV prevention (known as PrEP) among women in Kenya, including clinical epidemiology and implementation science studies. Dr. Pintye is currently the Principal Investigator of an NICHD-supported R01 study that will systematically quantify infant pre- and postnatal PrEP exposure and assess birth, bone, growth, and neurocognitive outcomes following PrEP exposure into early childhood. Dr. Pintye is the co-Principal Investigator of an NINRsupported R01 grant which aims to test an mHealth intervention to improve PrEP adherence among pregnant Kenyan women in a randomized trial while also gathering implementation and cost data. She is also a co-investigator on multiple implementation science evaluations of point-of-care STI diagnostics, PrEP provider training, and approaches to enhance the reach and quality of PrEP delivery for young women. Her long-term goals are to increase access, effectiveness, and scale-up of HIV and STI interventions and to educate the next generation of nurse scientists. Prior to her academic career, Dr. Pintye was a Peace Corps Volunteer in Botswana, where she developed a passion for HIV prevention among women and children.







Jacquelyn Taylor PhD, PNP-BC, FAHA, FAAN

Dr. Jacquelyn Taylor is the Helen F. Petit Professor of Nursing at Columbia University School of Nursing (CUSON), where she is also the Founder and Executive Director of the Center for Research on People of Color (CRPC). Dr. Taylor has been a trailblazer in cardiovascular genomics research among minority populations, and diversity and inclusion efforts, having been the first black woman to earn tenure at CUSON, New York University School of Nursing, and the Yale School of Nursing. Dr. Taylor has been recognized for her contributions to the advancement of biomedical sciences, health care, and public health, having been elected to the National Academy of Medicine in 2019. Dr. Taylor is committed to mentoring students and faculty as she received the Columbia University Irving Medical Center 2021 Mentor of the Year Award. Dr. Taylor has been PI of many studies including, but not limited to, an R01 from National Institute of Nursing Research (NINR)- The Intergenerational Impact of Genetic and Psychological Factors on Blood Pressure (InterGEN), a Presidential Early Career Award for Scientists and Engineers (PECASE) award from President Obama in 2017, a P20 from NINR on Precision Health in Diverse Populations in 2018, and an MPI on an R25 on Research Opportunities in Cardiovascular Diseases for Minority Undergrad and Grad Students Across the Health Sciences (RECV) in 2020. In addition to leading these grants, Dr. Taylor founded the Office of Diversity and Inclusion at the Yale School of Nursing and served as its inaugural Associate Dean of Diversity, and then went on to become the inaugural Endowed Chair of Health Equity and to develop and direct the Meyers Biological Laboratory at NYU before joining Columbia University.

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












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

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
